Short Description

A systematic study of the structure of contemporary English and its grammar. Students will explore and practice using proper grammatical structure. Emphasis is placed on grammar, though punctuation will be touched upon. Students will learn through lectures and practice of the language through both class and homework.

The course also aims to introduce basic grammatical concepts. It will review English tenses: simple present, present continuous, simple past, past continuous, present perfect, past perfect, present perfect continuous, future, etc.

In addition, modals, conditionals, passive voice, reported speech, articles, English parts of speech and phrasal verbs will be discussed and explained.
